



June 2006 Double Click Main Meeting Report

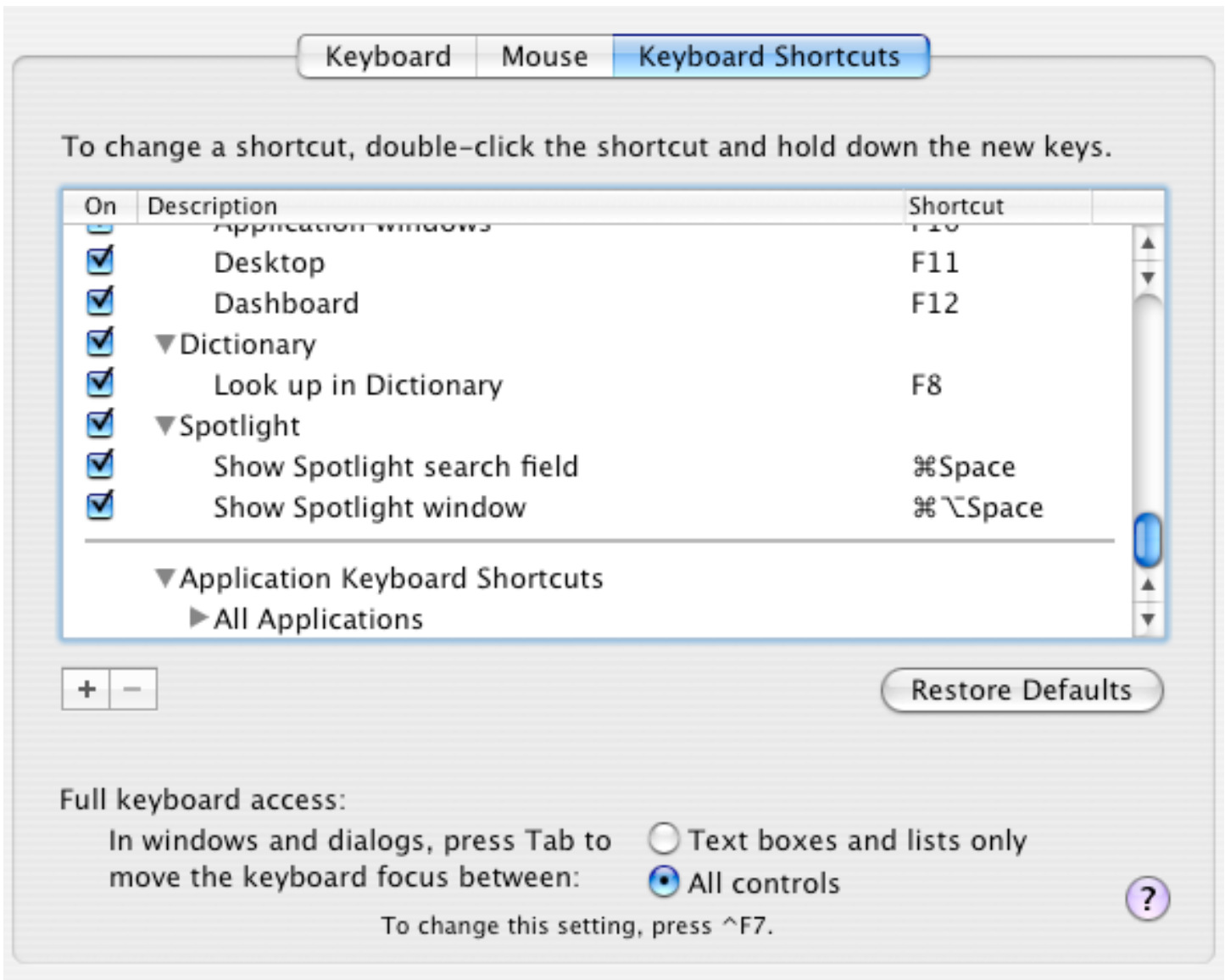

Beginners SIG Session

Steve Parker presented his "Beginners SIG" demonstration. Among other tips, he showed how to customize the application menus under OS X, adding custom key combinations.

This customization is accomplished via the "Keyboard Shortcuts" tab of the "Keyboard and Mouse" preference pane of "System Preferences" application.



"Q & A" Session / Announcements

The Questions and Answers session followed Steve's presentation. As usual, a wide variety of topics were discussed. Some printing and printer set-up problems were addressed, the new Apple MacBook (the Intel-based replacement for the iBook) was reported to have received a positive initial "buzz," and some iPhoto questions were addressed.

Jerry Smaglik, Double Click's Treasurer, discussed two new ideas to promote familiarity amongst Double Click members. Each would consist of very brief "talks" by members at our monthly meetings.

The **"3 Minute Ticker"** would be an opportunity for you to tell the rest of us at the meeting about a great computer program or feature you came upon... or something that turned out to be a waste of money! You could tell us about your best (or your worst) computer purchase, hardware or software, or perhaps about a good or bad experience relative to computer service. Share it with the rest of us! As the title of this feature implies, members will have three minutes to tell their story. A limited number of speakers (one or two) will be featured each month.

"Tell Us About Your Business" would provide Double Click members an opportunity to introduce the group to their business in a five to 10 minute talk. Suggested points that you may wish to address would be:

- are you the owner, or a key employee?
- when did your business start?
- what product or service does your company provide?
- tell us about the Mac computers you use.

File of the Month

VLC Media Player 0.8.5

Product Description:

VLC media player is a highly portable multimedia player for various audio and video formats (MPEG, MPEG-2, MPEG-4, DivX, mp3, ogg, ...) as well as DVDs, VCDs, and various streaming protocols.

Jim noted that VLC is especially handy if you download an audio or video file from the Internet that is in an unusual format and won't play with the various utilities that one normally uses for playback under OS X. Just as *GraphicConvertor* is superb for viewing a very wide variety of graphic formats, VLC enables one to hear and view a wide variety of audio and video formats.

Main Presentation

"One Man's Mac" and "Parallels" was presented by Dan Neesley, Double Click member, Mac aficionado and consultant. (In 1984, at North Shore Computers, Dan introduced many of us "old timers" to Macintosh, "the computer for the rest of us," and his leadership in hosting information sessions for local Macintosh users eventually led to the formation of Double Click.)

Dan started out by outlining the foundation of his organization of his own Macintosh under OS X: he doesn't use the "Documents" folder in his Home folder. Although the "Documents" folder is installed by default and Apple encourages users to store their files in the "Documents" folder, Dan argues that other files may be put there by applications and he'd rather keep his own files completely separate. Hence, he keeps all his files in a new folder that he has created in his Home folder. He calls it "All My Stuff" and he creates sub-folders in "All My Stuff" for email, photos, downloads, etc. With his Mac organized this way, he knows for certain that all of his stuff is indeed in his "All My Stuff" folder and is therefore pre-packaged for back-up, searching, sharing, etc.

The remainder of Dan's talk touched on a myriad of tips, suggestions and recommendations, including software, hardware, purchasing, organizing and more.

Apple's GarageBand 3
